New Lothrop Elementary School Annual Education Report (AER) Cover Letter

Dear Parents and Community Members:

We are pleased to present you with the Annual Education Report (AER) which provides key information on the 2022-23 educational progress for New Lothrop Elementary School. The AER addresses the complex reporting information required by federal and state laws. The school's report contains information about student assessment, accountability, and teacher quality. For the 2022-23 school year, schools were identified from previous years' performance using definitions and labels as required in the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). A Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) school is one that has at least one underperforming student subgroup in 2018-19. An Additional Targeted Support (ATS) school is one that has a student subgroup performing at the same level as the lowest 5% of all schools in the state in 2017-18. A Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) school is one whose performance is in the lowest 5% of all schools in the state or has a graduation rate at or below 67% in 2016-17. Some schools are not identified with any of these labels. In these cases, no label is given.

Our school was not identified with a label.

While we are pleased with our continued high-ranking state test scores as compared to schools in Shiawassee County and schools with like demographics, we are far from reaching our goals. Therefore, we are continuously working to improve the skills of each and every one of our students. We appreciate the continued support of parents, staff, and our community in this effort. This year we continued to use iReady as a diagnostic testing measure to help our students, staff, and parents measure individual growth. In addition, we offer the opportunity for every student to access the extra lessons designed at their own individual instructional level. We have seen positive gains with this addition to our curriculum. We are looking forward to continuing to monitor student growth and achievement with this school-wide diagnostic. 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- 1. PROCESS FOR ASSIGNING PUPILS TO THE SCHOOL
 - New Lothrop Elementary School is a small rural school with one elementary building. There is no need to have a process for assigning students who reside within our district boundaries. As part of state law, the district participates in the Schools of Choice (SOC) program for non-resident families. All students admitted to the district through SOC have completed a behavior, academic, and achievement background check. Once students are cleared, they are assigned on a space-available basis.
- 2. THE STATUS OF THE 3-5 YEAR SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT PLAN
 - New Lothrop Elementary School continues to use the school improvement process to reevaluate current goals, establish new goals, and collaboratively work together to improve our school's performance. Our goals this school year include addressing reading comprehension, math problem solving, writing across the curriculum, full implementation of Next Generation Science Standards at all grade levels, and addressing our College and Career Readiness standards. Math is an area where we regressed in the 2018-19 school year. Our Math Curriculum Council has investigated a new curriculum and have adopted the Bridges Math curriculum with Board approval. We are excited to see our students and staff grow with the Bridges math scope and sequence. We are also in the pilot process of ELA utilizing Core Knowledge Language Arts (CKLA), which is a knowledge-based curriculum with the science of reading focus.
- 3. A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF EACH SPECIALIZED SCHOOL
 - The elementary building houses Preschool, Latchkey, Title I, At-Risk, Developmental Kindergarten, and grades K-6.
- 4. IDENTIFY HOW TO ACCESS A COPY OF THE CORE CURRICULUM, A DESCRIPTION OF ITS IMPLEMENTATION, AND AN EXPLANATION OF THE VARIANCES FROM THE STATE'S MODEL
 - New Lothrop Elementary School had adopted the Common Core State Standards and our teachers work in grade-level teams to ensure the curriculum is addressing these standards. Copies of the core curriculum implemented at each grade level can be requested. There are no variances within our written curriculum.

 - New Lothrop Elementary students participate in both state and local assessments to identify gaps in the curriculum and to make necessary adjustments, thus ensuring our students' success. Please visit our school website to review the Annual Report, which
