Accordingly, Students will be able to...

US History

- Explain how the political, social, and economic transformations in America influence the evolving meaning of freedom and equality in the United States
- Explain how and why the meaning of freedom and equality in the United States changes as a result of industrialization
- Identify how did evolving ideas of freedom and equality influence Americans as the United States became an industrialized world power?
- Identify how did responses to President Wilson's Fourteen Points illustrate tensions between interventionism and isolationism, as well as instability in the world?
- Identify how did domestic and international events affect the changing meaning of freedom and equality?
- Identify how does the American desire to maintain the four freedoms (from want, from fear, of speech) change the United States's role in the world?
- Explain how did the idea of freedom influence and reflect the Cold War era?
- Explain why the Civil Right Movement intensifies after WWII?
- Explain how domestic and international events both affect and reflect the changing meaning of freedom and equality in the United States?

World History

- Identify how major transformations affect societal structures in early history and set the foundations for expanding networks of exchange
- Identify how and to what effect did networks of exchange transform human society
- Explain how did growing trade, the spread of ideas, and technological developments result in the First Global Age?
- Explain how and why life changed during the Age of Global Revolutions?
- Identify how did military, political, technological, and economic changes influence a new world order?
- Explain how the Cold War and its end reshaped the political and economic structure of the world?
- Identify how contemporary global issues are reflective of both historic conflict between civilizations and increased globalization?

Government

- Identify how different views have led to different types of government, how views have shaped the U.S Constitution, and what is meant by government by, for, and of the people.
- Describe how power is limited, shared, and distributed in American government.
 Establish how federalism serves the needs of the people and how the people can influence public policy.
- State how laws are made and distinguish how people, interest groups, the media, political parties, and public opinion affect policy.

- Identify how the purpose of government and Constitutional principles are reflected in the executive branch and describe how economic, political, cultural, and national security issues affect foreign policy decisions.
- Express how Congress established the Judicial Branch of the government and examine how citizen's rights are guaranteed through the U.S Constitution.
